ORDINANCE NO. 2023-01

AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RE-CREATE CHAPTER 24, ARTICLE II OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF RANDOM LAKE, SHEBOYGAN COUNTY, WISCONSIN, CONCERNING RESIDENCY RESTRICTIONS FOR SEX OFFENDERS

WHEREAS, the Village Board of the Village of Random Lake, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, deems it a priority to act in the interest of public safety within our community, particularly in the interest of our children; and

WHEREAS, according to the U.S. Department of Justice, there are a record number of convicted sex offenders living in our communities¹; and

WHEREAS, all convicted child sex offenders have proven themselves to be dangerous²; and

WHEREAS, research in this area has established sex offenders are rearrested for sex crimes four times more frequently than non-sex offenders³; and

WHEREAS, the reduction of crime and criminal recidivism are inextricably linked to public safety within our community; and

WHEREAS, the risks posed by sex offenders against children, are nationally recognized in such landmark legislation as the 1994 Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act; 1996 Megan's Laws; and the 2006 Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act; and these risks are also recognized by legislation in every State in the United States of America including Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board finds that the data concerning child sex offenders is horrific and demonstrates the need for action, including the following⁴:

- "sex crimes are unfortunately fairly common in the United States."
- "It is estimated that one in every five girls and one in every seven boys are sexually abused by the time they reach adulthood."
- "Children are particularly vulnerable. Approximately 67% of all victims of reported sexual assaults are under the age of 18, and more than half of these victims are under the age of 12."
- "Most sexual offenses are committed by someone the victim knows ... or acquaintance."

- "No single factor or combination of factors can fully explain why someone offends sexually, though some factors may combine to increase people's tendency to offend. These factors are ... [physiological, sociocultural, developmental] and situational/circumstantial (e.g. having easy access to victims...)."
- "About 12% to 24% of sex offenders will reoffend."

WHEREAS, the Village Board also finds these statistics of the U.S. Department of Justice to be shocking and a call to action⁵:

- "Approximately 1.8 million adolescents in the United States have been victims of sexual assault."
- "An estimated 60% of perpetrators of sexual abuse are known to the child but are not family members, e.g. family friends, babysitters, child care providers, neighbors."

WHEREAS, in September of 2015 the State of Wisconsin Department of Corrections conducted an extensive study of sex offender recidivism between 1997 and 2010, and found that in total there were 631 instances (4.9% of all releases) of sexual re-offending, and the top two types of re-offense were second degree sexual assault of a child (103 offenses), first degree sexual assault of a child (100 offenses); and within the top 10 re-offenses also were sex with a child ages 16 or older (46 offenses) and repeated sexual assault of the same child (33 offenses); and the study concludes that of all the repeat offenses committed by sex offenders, "sex offenses that specifically reference children represent a greater proportion of the whole;"

WHEREAS, data within the Village of Random Lake may not provide a large enough sample size for statistical analysis, however, there is no reason to believe the outcomes would be different in the Village than were demonstrated statewide by the Department of Corrections data; and

WHEREAS, the creation of Sex Offender Residency Restrictions and Safety Zones by municipal ordinance around locations where children regularly congregate is a reasonable step toward protecting children and deterring recidivism by reducing the opportunity for new offenses within our community; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board has reviewed many studies and reports concerning recidivism of sex offenders and the effectiveness of sex offender residency restrictions⁷, and has been fully advised in the matter; and

WHEREAS, the literature on the subject includes some studies that support the practice of imposing sex offender residency restrictions and others that are critical of the practice; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board finds it to be significant that some of the key studies that have concluded that sex offender residency restrictions have limited effectiveness have added significant qualifications to that conclusion; e.g. in "An Evaluation of Sex Offender Residency Restrictions in Michigan and Missouri," (Huebner, et al., 2013), the authors generally do not support sex offender residency restrictions, but nevertheless find that following adoption of sex offender residency restrictions "the rate of recidivism for technical violations significantly decreased for Missouri sex offenders..." (id. at 9) and "the number of sex offense convictions did decline..." in Missouri (id. at 10); and

WHEREAS, the Village Board recognizes the merits, mentioned in some studies, of individualized consideration of the risks and benefits of residency restrictions on an offender-by-offender basis, and the Village has carefully considered how it can best provide this individualized consideration, and has created an Appeals Board with sufficient jurisdiction to ensure that the ordinance does not banish sex offenders from the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board recognizes that it cannot eliminate all risk of child sex offender re- offense, and it must balance all of the competing public policies, but intends by these regulations to strike the legislative balance that is appropriate for the circumstances of the Village of Random Lake; and

WHEREAS, it is not the intent of this ordinance to banish sex offenders from residing within the Village of Random Lake and careful attention has been given to ensure that there are ample locations for sex offenders to reside within the Village of Random Lake in compliance with the requirements of this ordinance:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Village Board of the Village of Random Lake, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

These include but are not limited to: Recidivism of sex offenders released from prison in 1994, U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, copyright November 2003; The final report of the Commission to Improve Community Safety and Sex Offender Accountability, of the State of Maine, dated January 2004; Sex Offender Recidivism Prediction, Correctional Service of Canada dated October 14, 2004; Recidivism of Sex Offenders, May 2001, Center for Sex Offender Management; Treating Sex Offenders, Wisconsin Lawyer Magazine, October 1994; The Impact of Residency Restrictions on Sex Offenders and Correctional Management Practices: A Literature Review, Marcus Nieto and Professor David Jung, California Research Bureau, California State Library, August 2006; Sex Offenders: You Are Now Free to Move About the Country, and Analysis of Doe v. Miller's Effects on Sex Offender Residential Restrictions, UMKC Law Review, Spring 2005; There Goes the Neighborhood? Estimates of the Impact of Crime Risk on Property Values from Megan's Laws, Linden and Rockoff, National Bureau of Economic Research, May 2006; The Effect of Proximity to a Registered Sex Offender's Residence on Single-Family Housing Selling Price, Goliath Appraisal Journal, July 2003; Sex Offenders, Sexually Violent Predators, Punishment, Residence Restrictions and Monitoring, California Proposition 83, Analysis by the Legislative Analyst; An Evaluation of Sex Offender Residency Restrictions in Michigan and Missouri, Huebner, et al., 2013.

SECTION 1: Chapter 24 of the Village of Random Lake Municipal Code entitled, "Offenses," Article II entitled "Sexual Offender Residency Restrictions" is hereby repealed and re-created as depicted in attached Exhibit A, which is incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 2: CONTINUATION OF EXISTING PROVISIONS

The provisions of this ordinance, to the extent that they are substantively the same as those of the ordinances in force immediately prior to the enactment of this ordinance, are intended as a continuation of such ordinances and not as new enactments, and the effectiveness of such provisions shall date from the date of adoption of the prior ordinances. In addition, the adoption of this ordinance shall not affect any action, prosecution or proceeding brought for the enforcement of any right or liability established, accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the effective date of this ordinance for the time that such provision was in effect, and the repeal of any such provisions is stayed pending the final resolution of such actions, including appeals.

SECTION 3: SEVERABILITY.

The several sections of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section or provision thereof shall be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unlawful, or unenforceable, such declaration shall apply only to the specific section(s) or portion(s) thereof directly specified in said declaration, and shall not affect the validity of any other provisions, sections, or portions of the Ordinance, which shall remain in full force and effect. Any other Ordinances whose terms are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to those terms that conflict.

SECTION 4: EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and posting/publication as provided by law.

Exhibit A

ARTICLE II. SEXUAL OFFENDER RESIDENCY RESTRICTIONS¹

Sec. 24-37. Finding and intent.

- (a) Repeat sexual offenders, sexual offenders who use physical violence, and sexual offenders who prey on children are sexual predators who present an extreme threat to public safety. The Village Board has closely considered this question and had made numerous findings and expressions of intent within the preamble to the Ordinance which adopts this Code Section which are incorporated herein by reference. Sexual offenders are extremely likely to use physical violence and to repeat their offenses; and most sexual offenders commit many offenses, have many more victims than are ever reported, and are prosecuted for only a fraction of their crimes. This makes the cost of sexual offender victimization to society atlarge, while incalculable, clearly exorbitant.
- (b) It is the intent of this article not to impose a criminal penalty but rather to serve the village's compelling interest to promote, protect, and improve the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the village by creating areas around locations where children regularly congregate in concentrated numbers wherein certain sexual offenders and sexual predators are prohibited from establishing temporary or permanent residence.

Sec. 24-38. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except when the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Child means a person under the age of 16 years.

Child safety location: the site upon which any of the following are located:

- (1) Public parks;
- (2) Public swimming pools;
- (3) Public libraries;
- (4) Recreational trails;
- (5) Public playgrounds;
- (6) Schools;
- (7) Athletic fields used by children;
- (8) Daycare facilities.

Child safety zone: any place within the village that is located within 900 feet of any child safety location.

Designated Offender means:

1. any person who is required to register under Wis. Stats. § 301.45 for any sexual offense, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 301.45, against a child or any person who is required to

register under Wis. Stats. § 301.45 and who has been designated a special bulletin notification (SBN) sex offender pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 301.46(2) and (2m):

- 1-2. Any person subject to the sex crimes commitment provisions of §975.06, Wis. Stats.; or
- 2.3. Any person found not guilty by reason of disease or mental defect placed on lifetime supervision under §971.17(1j), Wis. Stats.

Minor means a person under the age of 17 years.

Permanent residence means a place where the person abides, lodges, or resides for 14 or more consecutive days.

Temporary residence means a place where the person abides, lodges, or resides for a period of 14 or more days in the aggregate during any calendar year and which is not the person's permanent address or a place where the person routinely abides, lodges, or resides for a period of four or more consecutive or non-consecutive days in any month and which is not the person's permanent residence.

Sec. 24-39. Prohibited acts and residence locations.

- (a) Prohibited location of residence. It is unlawful for any dDesignated oOffender to establish a permanent residence or temporary residence within 900 feet of any school, licensed day care center, park, recreational trail, playground or place of worship.
- (b) Prohibited activity. It is unlawful for any dDesignated oOffender to participate in a holiday event involving children under 18 years of age, such as distributing candy or other items to children. Holiday events in which the Designated oOffender is the parent or guardian of the children involved, and no non-familial children are present, are exempt from this subsection. Participation is to be defined as actively taking part in the event.
- (c) Measurement of distance.
 - (1) For the purposes of determining the minimum distance separation, the requirement shall be measured by following a straight line from the outer property line of the permanent residence or temporary residence to the nearest outer property line of a school, licensed day care center, park, recreational trail, playground or place of worship.
 - (2) The village engineer shall prepare, maintain and file with the village clerk-treasurer an official map showing prohibited locations as defined by this article. The engineer shall update the map at least annually to reflect any changes in the location of prohibited zones and file said updated map with the village clerk-treasurer. These shall be designated on the map as child safety zones.
- (d) Exceptions. A dDesignated oOffender residing within a prohibited area as described in this section does not commit a violation of this section if any of the following apply:
 - (1) The person established the permanent residence or temporary residence and reported and registered the residence pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 301.45 before the effective date of the ordinance from which this article is derived.
 - (2) The person is a minor and is not required to register under Wis. Stats. § 301.45 or 301.46.

- (3) The school, licensed day care center, park, recreational trail or playground within 900 feet of the person's permanent residence was opened after the person established the permanent residence or temporary residence and reported and registered the residence pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 301.45.
- (e) Child safety zone exceptions. A sex <u>Designated oOffender</u> in an area otherwise prohibited by this chapter does not commit a violation if any of the following apply:
 - (1) The property supporting the child safety location use also supports a church, synagogue, mosque, temple or other place of religious worship, subject to the following conditions:
 - a. Entrance and presence on the property may occur only during hours of worship or other religious program or service; and
 - b. Written advance notice is made from the sex_Designated_oOffender to a person in charge of the place of religious worship and approval from the person in charge of the place of religious worship as designated by the place of religious worship is made in return, of the attendance by the sex_Designated_oOffender; and
 - c. The <u>sexDesignated oOffender</u> may not participate in any religious education programs that include individuals under the age of 18.
 - (2) The property surrounding the child safety location use also supports a use lawfully attended by the sexDesignated oOffender's natural or adopted child or children, which child's use reasonably requires the attendance of the sexDesignated oOffender, provided that the entrance and presence of the property occurs only during the hours of activity related to the use by the child or children.
 - (3) The property support the child safety location use also supports a polling location in a local, state or federal election, subject to the following conditions:
 - a. The sexDesignated oOffender is eligible to vote.
 - b. The polling location is the designated polling location for the <u>sexDesignated</u> ⊕Offender.
 - c. The <u>sexDesignated</u> <u>oOffender</u> casts his or her ballot with whatever usual and customary assistance is available and vacates the property immediately after voting.
 - (4) The property supporting the child safety location use also supports a school lawfully attended by the sexDesignated only remain on the property at such times that are reasonably required for his or her educational purposes.
 - (5) The property supporting the child safety location use also supports a governmental building, provided that the sex_Designated eOffender vacates the property immediately after completing the activity that required his or her presence at the property.
 - (6) The sexDesignated Offender was exercising his or her First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitutions or Wisconsin Constitution, including freedom of speech and the right of assembly.

Sec. 24-40. Property owners prohibited from renting real property to certain sexual offenders and sexual predators; penalties.

- (a) It is unlawful to let or rent any place, structure, or part thereof, trailer or other conveyance, with the knowledge that it will be used as a permanent residence or temporary residence by any person prohibited from establishing such permanent residence or temporary residence pursuant to this article, if such place, structure, or part thereof, trailer or other conveyance, is located within a prohibited location zone described in this section, and not subject to an exception set forth in this section.
- (b) A property owner's failure to comply with this section shall constitute a violation of this article, and shall subject the property owner to the penalties set forth in this section.

Sec. 24-41. Appeal.

The 900-foot requirement set forth in section 24-39 may be waived upon approval of the police and fire committee and village board through appeal by the affected party. Such appeal shall be made in writing to the village clerk-treasurer's office, who shall forward the request to the village board for referral to the police and fire committee, which shall receive reports from law enforcement agencies on such appeal.


The police and fire committee shall convene and consider the public interest as well as the affected party's presentation and concerns. The committee shall conduct an individual risk assessment. The sexDesignated eOffender that filed the appeal shall appear at any hearing, unless otherwise approved by the committee. The committee shall consider the specific facts and circumstances of each appellant and determine whether the appellant presents a threat to public safety if he or she resides at the proposed location. The committee shall consider factors, which may include, but are not limited to: circumstances surrounding the offense; relationship of the appellant and victim; presence or use of force; presence of enticement; need to protect the victim or similarly situated individuals; current dangerousness of the appellant; proximity in time from the original offense; any criminal offense, ordinance or rule violations committed since the original offense, including failure to register or comply with restrictions set by a bond, parole or probation; time out of incarceration; current supervision status of the by the Department of Correction; counseling and treatment history; credibility of the appellant; remorse; proximity of proposed residence to a child safety zone; support network of appellant near proposed residence; alternative housing options.

After deliberation, the police and fire committee shall forward its recommendation to the village board for consideration. The village board shall forward its decision in writing via the minutes or otherwise to the county sheriff's department for their information and action. A written copy of the decision shall be provided to the affected party. If an exemption is granted to an appellant and the appellant subsequently voluntarily moves out of the village and later desires to resume residency in the village, the appellant must file a new appeal with the village requesting an exemption.

Sec. 24-42. Exception for Placements under Chapter 980 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(a) To the extent required by Section 980.135 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Chapter, the Village of Random Lake hereby exempts and may not enforce any portion thereof that restricts or prohibits a Designated Offender from residing at a certain location or that restricts or prohibits a

person from providing housing to a Designated Offender against an individual who is released under Wisconsin Statutes Section 980.08, or against a person who provides housing to such individual, so long as the individual is subject to supervised release under Chapter 980 of the Wisconsin Statutes, the individual is residing where he or she is ordered to reside under Section 980.08 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and the individual is in compliances with all court orders issued under Chapter 980 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Schedule for Appointment of Agent by Corporation / Nonprofit Organization or Limited Liability Company

Submit to municipal clerk.

All corporations/organizations or limited liability companies applying for a license to sell fermented malt beverages and/or intoxicating liquor must appoint an agent. The following questions must be answered by the agent. The appointment must be signed by an officer of the corporation/organization or one member/manager of a limited liability company and the recommendation made by the proper local official.



Meeting Minutes

- 1. Call to Order, Roll Call: President San Felippo called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm. Trustees present included Blaine Werner, Elizabeth Manian, Mike San Felippo, Duane Urbanski, Barbara Ruege, and Keri Wallenkamp. Eric Stowell attended virtually. Village staff present included Clerk/Treasurer Stephanie and DPW Director Peter Lederer. For additional attendees see attached sign-in sheet.
- 2. Pledge of Allegiance: Those present stood to recite the Pledge of Allegiance.
- 3. Public Comments.

Bill Goehring would like to thank all municipal employees and board members for their hard work. Inquires as to the Sheboygan County tax rate went down in the Town of Sherman but did it go up in the Village of Random Lake. President San Felippo informed the audience the county tax rate went up 4.4% in the village.

4. New Business:

a. Discussion and Possible Action the renewal Liability, Property Crime, Workers Compensation, and Employers Liability Insurance for 2023.

Clerk Waala informed the board the total of all policies will be increasing by 5.48% which is lower then the budgeted 9% estimate.

Trustee Werner inquired as to if the Fire Department vehicles and buildings should be part of the policy as they are a trust. Clerk Waala informed the board the policy does include the vehicles and building.

Trustee Wallenkamp made a motion to approve as submitted, motion was seconded by Trustee Urbanski. Motion carried 6-1, Werner nay.

b. Discussion and Possible Action of the Establishment of Fire Protection Contract with the Town of Fredonia

Trustee Werner inquired as to if Fredonia and the Waubeka departments were combining. Fire Chief Depies informed the board at this time none of that has been done.

Trustee Wallenkamp made a motion to approve as submitted, motion was seconded by Trustee Stowell. Motion carried 7-0.

c. Discussion and Possible Action on the Recommendation of the Fire Department on the Medical Director position

Fire Chief Depies informed the board the Fire Department met last week and voted to stay with Dr Zils and will reevaluate in 1 year.

Trustee Werner read a letter sent to him by Dr Zils. Recommends to the board that Dr Zils is not able to prevent him from being on the ambulance but has done so which is illegal. Dr Martins is the Adell and

Town of Scott director and would request it make sense to have the same local examiner.

Trustee Ruege states that if there is potential of unbiased then she is unable to make a decision. This is more political then in the best interest of the village.

Trustee Wallenkamp inquires as to how many candidates were presented for the role. Fire Chief Depies informed the board the agenda item was to decide to seek others or stay with Dr Zils. There was a unanimous vote to stay with Dr Zils.

Fire Chief Depies states that Dr Zils should have the right to speak his side as he has been the Director for approximately 7 years.

Trustee Werner recommends no decision be made tonight and that Dr Martins be interviewed.

Trustee Wallenkamp made a motion to postpone a decision until January for closed session with Dr Zils and the village attorney, motion was seconded by Trustee Urbanski. Motion carried 5-0, Stowell unavailable for vote, Werner abstain.

d. Presentation by Beth Manian and Duane Urbanski reviewing recent training

Trustee Manian presented to the board a presentation from a Beaver Dam representative on their downtown revitalization. Would recommend using same format as it was all planned out per detail. Took a walk around La Crosse and viewed the changes completed. Leadership training and the circle of community were her favorite part.

Trustee Urbanski presented to the board a presentation on Public Safety Funding with the possibility of going to a referendum or combining with local municipalities. Gave a grants handout on information found and suggested possibly creating a committee to research and apply for available grants.

President San Felippo inquires as to why the Computer Services Specialists invoice was so high for a new computer as in the past, they were quite smaller.
